Saturday afternoon at the Huntington Beach event, in a battle that was considerably shorter than the morning conflict, the men of the 8th literally stepped over fallen Yankees as our line pressed forward amid the roar of the canons and the dense smoke that blanketed the field. Though many of our comrades fell to the volume of blue belly musketry, the 8th fought valiantly and overcame the invading foe. As our column marched back to camp, a chorus of proud Southern voices was heard singing the words to one of the most familiar tunes of the war, familiar to most with the exception of this new private. Later, when walking to visit the Sutlers, a spectator came up to me and asked what was the song that our men were singing as they marched. She commented that it sounded moving to hear a long column of soldiers singing as they marched and suggested that more units do that. Well, the song was Bonnie Blue Flag and not knowing the words to it or the history behind it, I determined to learn both.

Back in 1810 the blue flag with the single star was hoisted by a group of West Floridian Dragoons when they captured the Fort of Baton Rouge. Three days Declaration of

Independence was signed and the flag became the symbol of the new republic. By the end of that year the flag was replaced by the United States flag when President Madison declared West Florida to be under the Louisiana Territory. The flag was also used by the Republic of Texas from 1836 to 1839. With secession, the flag was raised over the Mississippi capitol in 1861 and inspired Harry McCarthy to pen the patriotic words to the tune that was to be adopted in the hearts of thousands.
